
will be held on

### 2021 is a Census Year!

s no-one has ever actually lived in the Windmill it has never been mentioned in the National Censuses. These began in 1841 and have occurred every ten years since. (except 1941)



It is in this 1841 Census that we find the first mention of a 'miller'. His name is Edward Ledgerton who is 35 and born in Sussex. Sadly, that's as much as this Census tells us about him. It does show him living in 'Blatchington House' where a William Hodson, 63, is listed as a Farmer. There are 7 other households in the village, with 2 shepherds, a wheelwright, and a multitude of agricultural labourers. A total of 64 residents of West Blatchington.

By 1851 the village had shrunk to 53 residents, and John Hodson had succeeded his father, William, as the Farmer of 700 acres, but there is no mention of Edward Ledgerton. However, we do have mention of William Strudwick who is thought to have carried out the role of Miller.



In 1861 there are 59 residents and the Farm has grown to 800 acres. William now appears to be called Richard(!) and he is living in Toads Hole.

The 1871 Census reveals John's brother, George Hodson, as Head of the 'Farm House' that now has an extra 50 acres. Richard Strudwick is still one of the 70 residents of the 'village', though his address has become 'Frogs Hole'!

Then in 1881 we see the first appearance of George Whittington. He is thought to have worked with Richard, who is still in the village, aged 78. It is in this year Richard cleared a heavy fall of snow from the fantail to ensure the sweeps would still turn to the wind! George Hodson remains head of the farm.

The 1891 Census was the last before the Windmill ceased being a working mill. John Brown is now head of the Farm and there are no Strudwicks in the village. We can still find George Whittington, at a more specific address.

There were 95 residents of 'the Ecclesiastical District of West Blatchington'. I wonder what the count will be in 2021!

One thing is certain, there is no 'miller'.
